COVID -19 PANDEMIC IN KUNENE REGION

Corona Virus well known as COVID-19 to most, is a virus that is presumed to have started in the Asian continent, and was of no great concern to the Namibian nation, until the President of the Republic of Namibia, His Excellency, Dr Hage Geingob announced and proclaimed a State of Emergency on the 17th of March 2020.

Soon after the lockdown of Khomas and Erongo regions was established, subsequently the nation-wide lockdown followed.

The nation-wide lockdown was lifted and Stage 2 of the Regulations commenced that were put in place to re-open with strict precautions. In this stage everyone was allowed to travel in-between regions, have to return to work, some businesses re-opened for operation and all were required to wear masks when in public and at workplaces. Of current we are in Stage 3 of the implementation stages of the COVID-19.

The Kunene region is one of the regions with the most marginalized people. This caused a lot of issues and barriers in information dissemination and misunderstanding of information to the less privileged. The biggest concern is in reaching villages in the rural areas as well as provision of water, food and hygiene awareness to the people in informal settlements. One can say the Kunene region had a very challenging situation but worked day and

night to ensure that the communities are well informed in their indigenous languages. Team Kunene had an intensive health education in all the constituencies, and delivered water to the furthest villages which had limited water access.

It is also important to note that through the early stages of the pandemic, stakeholders came in to assist where they can. Special gratitude goes out to Nexus for donating 5 Mobile Water Tankers; Frans Indongo Trust for donating food worth N\$150 000.00; OK Foods Outjo for donating food to the Outjo Constituency Office, Governor of Erongo for collaborating with the Governor of Kunene to assist the community in Sorri- Sorris and the Opuwo Annual Trade Fair Committee for distributing food parcels in the Opuwo Urban Constituency, as well as to everyone else who have assisted in terms of logistics and distribution in the region.

NAMIBIA RED CROSS SOCIETY "LENDHAND" IN KUNENE REGION

What seemed as a mere courtesy call to the Kunene Regional Council, has turned out to be a fruitful engagement for the people of Kunene region.

On the 27th of January 2020 the Namibia Red Cross Society Communication and Partnership Manager, Edmund Khoaseb had a short engagement meeting with the Regional Council aimed to initiate future collaborations towards the Disaster Risk Management Programme in the region. Today, the Red Cross Society in its efforts contributed towards the drought crisis in Namibia and has rehabilitated eight (8) hand water pumps.

The above was made possible by two donors, the Government of Japan and ExxonMobil. Japan has provided a grant of N\$ 1,200 000.00, and ExxonMobil an amount of N\$ 697 426.40 amounting to N\$ 1, 897 426.40 towards the WASH Project aimed at water, sanitation and hygiene promotion within the region.

The eight (8) rehabilitated water points are set to benefit about 8000 beneficiaries directly and 12 000 beneficiaries indirectly. The hand water pumps were rehabilitated in identified areas that are considered to be dry such as Okorosave, Okatati, Omuingindiuakekuro,

Okongutirua, Omao, Ondore and Oukapaue.

In addition to this, the Red Cross Society has dedicated itself to promoting hygiene practices, distributing water purification tablets and jerry cans for water storage to about 300 households with the main aim of providing access to safe clean water for domestic and livestock consumption.

Health education was also provided in the areas of Ombombo, Okatapati, Otjipoko, Otjozongombe, Okarivizu, Okozonduno, Oruvandjei, Omuramba, Ondevete, Omunuandjai, Okavare, Omitumbirua, Okauuore, Okakujukakozohura, Otjapitjapi, Okahua, Otuvero

and Ohauua.

The Red Cross Society will continue with this project throughout the year 2020 and aims to cover as many people as possible through its health education on hygiene, which will be very beneficial during this time of the COVID-19 pandemic.

The Governor and his team, for days, distributed water to areas with limited water access especially in the informal settlements. This not only encouraged the Regional Councillors to be on the ground assisting the community but set the trend for other Regional

Governors country-wide to go out on the ground towards the fight of the COVID-19 pandemic. The Office of the Governor translated all precautionary measures to fighting COVID-19 in most vernacular languages in the region, creating intensive knowledge on the virus from the very beginning when cases were first confirmed in Namibia. This contributed immensely to the awareness of the virus and saving most lives especially in the Kunene region where the dissemination of information is challenging.

Alliances were formed when the Governor joined forces with the Governor of Erongo region Hon. Neville Andre Itope in distributing food parcels to the Ani#gâb community in Sorri-Sorris an area where both the Kunene and Erongo community reside.

HOW TO BUILD A TIPPY TAP AT YOUR WORKPLACE, BUSINESS, COMMUNITY OR HOME

With the Corona Virus pandemic or better known as COVID-19, keeping a good hygiene seems to be one of the best measures that can be used to prevent the virus from spreading.

Regular washing of hands with soap under running water seems to be one of

the easier solution on top of wearing a masks and using hand sanitizer.

It is however important to note that despite washing your hands and wearing a mask, one still needs to maintain and practice social distancing of 1 Smeter from others at all times.

Below is a guide of how to create your own Tippy Tap sourced from Development Workshop Namibia as their contribution towards the fight of COVID-19 and their outreach in sharing information and donating Tippy Tap Equipment in some areas of Kunene region.

HOW TO PROTECT YOURSELF FROM THE CORONAVIRUS



- Keep 2 metre distance from others
- Wash your hands frequently with soap and under running water for 20 seconds
- **BUILD A TIPPY TAP**
- an easy, cheap and safe hand washing stand

INTRODUCTION

This step-by-step guide describes how to build a tippy tap, a simple homemade handwashing stand with running water.

The tippy tap consists of a 5-liter container hanging on a horizontal stick. The container can be tipped by pulling a rope through the cap. The rope is attached to a stick lying on the ground, which is pushed down by foot.

MATERIALS NEEDED:



1. Two wooden branches of 1.1-metre length, with Y-shaped end *(in case you can't find a Y-shaped wooden branches you can use any wood or metal stick, provided you properly tie the ends with a rope or wire).*
2. Two thinner sticks of 1-metre length.
3. A saw or mesheti (panga) to cut the wood.
4. A nail
5. Lengths of rope
6. A 5-liter container
7. Liquid handwashing soap or a piece of soap
8. A bag of stones or gravel (locally available)

STEP-BY-STEP GUIDE

1.

PREPARING THE STAND

Take two pieces of wood or metal, about 1.1 metres long each. Cut two thinner branches, each 1 metre long. Attach a piece of string of 1 metre length to one of the sticks.

2.

MARKING THE HOLE



Mark the location for the hole on the container, around 12cm below the cap.

3.

HEATING THE NAIL



Hold the nail with a pair of pliers.

4.

MAKING THE HOLES



With a hot nail, make a hole in the container, and a second hole in the cap.

5.

INSERTING THE ROPE



Put the rope, which is attached to the stick, through the hole in the cap.

6.

KNOTTING THE ROPE



Tie a knot at the end of the rope which cannot pass through the hole.

7.

PUTTING IT TOGETHER



Close the container. The stick is now connected to the container with the rope.

8.

FILLING THE CONTAINER



Fill the container with water up to the level of the hole and add liquid soap.

9.

PUTTING THE POLES IN THE GROUND



Using a shovel, put the poles in the ground to depth of 30cm. The distance between the poles should be at least 70 cm.

10.

HANGING UP THE CONTAINER



Put the stick through the handle of the container and put the stick between the poles. Adjust the length of the rope such that the end of the stick is about 15 cm above the ground.

11.

STONE OR GRAVEL SOAK AWAY PIT



Between the two poles, below the container dig a hole of 50 x 50 cm, and 20 cm deep. Fill the hole with gravel or stone. The water soaks away in the hole and prevents a mudhole from forming. The gravel also keeps mosquitos from breeding.

12.

USING THE TIPPY TAP



Push the stick down with your foot. This tips the container, which makes water run out of the hole. Wet your hands and release the stick. Apply soap to your hands. Push the stick down again and clean your hands.

Martin Haraeb is the longest serving employee of Kunene Regional Council. He has dedicated his life serving the Regional Council for 24 years and counting.

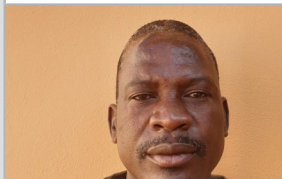
